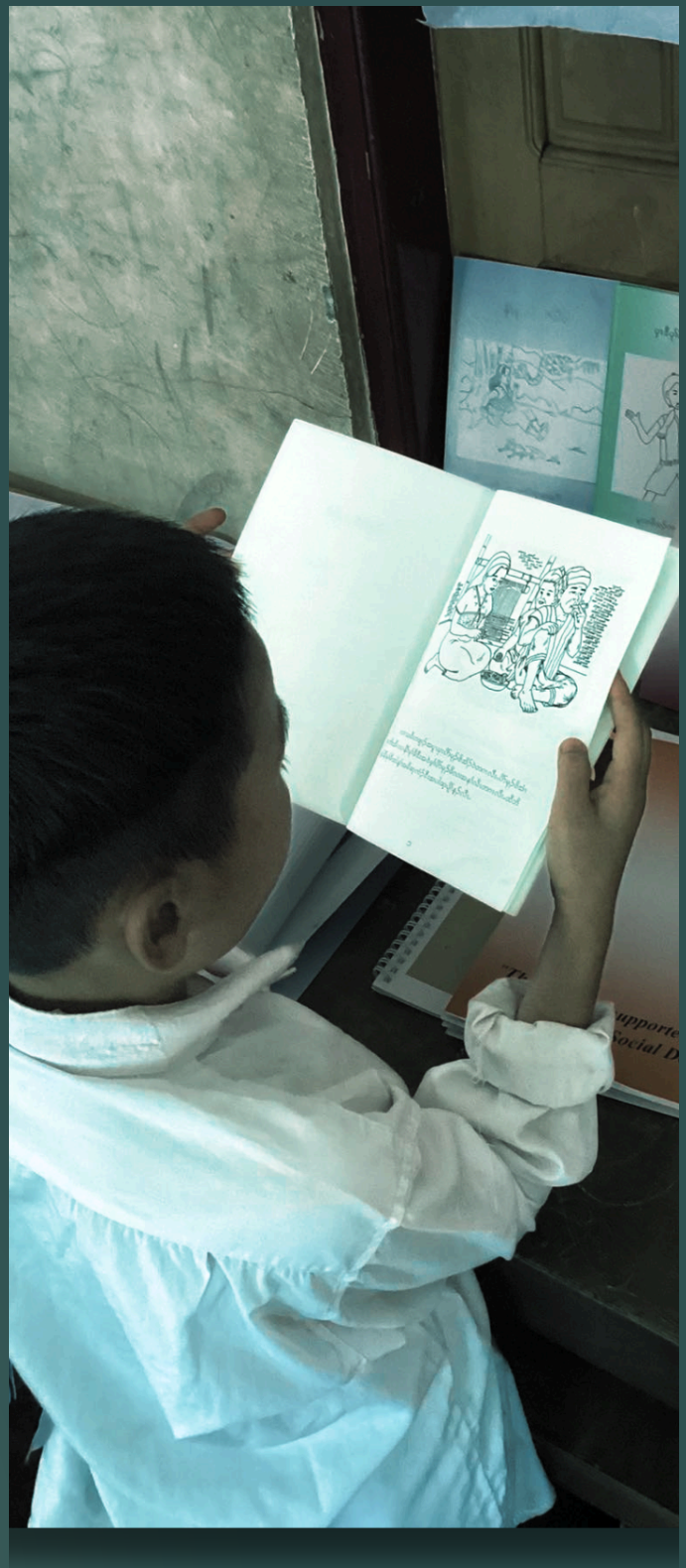

Mother-Tongue-Based-Education: A Foundation for Inclusive and Quality Learning

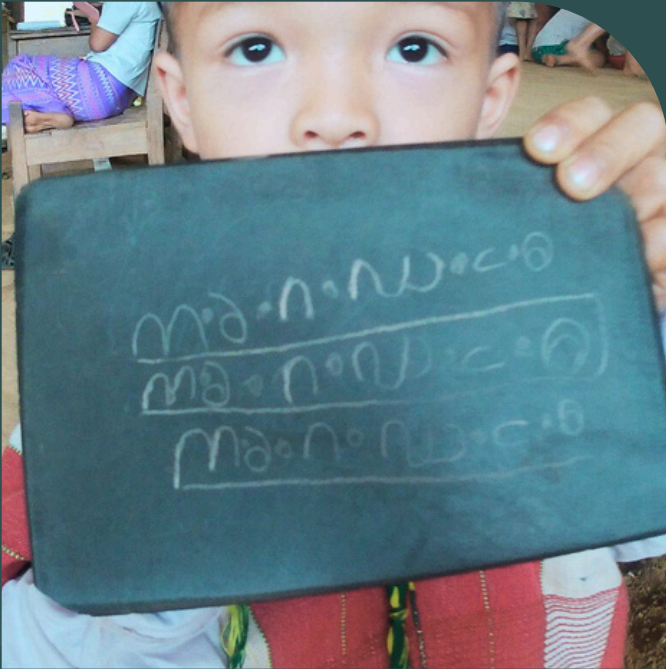

Mother-tongue-based education lays a solid foundation for lifelong learning while supporting successful transition to additional languages.

In Myanmar, the Kawthoolei education system, led by the Karen Education and Culture Department (KECD), demonstrates how education rooted in mother language strengthens learning outcomes, preserves culture identity, and promotes inclusion for ethnic communities in conflict-affected and underserved areas.

Why Mother Language in Education Matters



UNESCO recognizes mother-tongue-based multilingual education as a cornerstone of inclusive, equitable, and quality education. Instruction in learners' first language improves understanding of core concepts, increases classroom participation, and reduces dropout rates particularly for children from ethnic and minority language communities. Mother-tongue-based education also supports effective multilingualism. A strong foundation in the first language enhances the acquisition of national and international languages, contributing to better long-term academic and social outcomes.

- SDG 4.1: Ensure inclusive and equitable quality primary and secondary education by improving learning outcomes through first-language instruction.

- SDG 4.7: Promotes respect for culture diversity, linguistic heritage, and global citizenship through education.
- SDG 4.c: Strengthens teacher capacity through culturally responsive pedagogy and mother-tongue-based teaching practices.

Mother-Tongue-Based Education in Kawthoolei



The Karen Education and Culture Department (KECD) plays a pivotal role in promoting mother-tongue-based education. Through comprehensive training sessions, KECD prepares teachers to effectively deliver curriculum in the Karen language, enhancing educational outcomes and cultural relevance for students in Kawthoolei.

Role of the Karen Education and Culture Department (KECD)

The Karen Education and Culture Department (KECD) is the principal authority responsible for the design, coordination, and implementation of the Kawthoolei education system. KECD plays a central role in safeguarding that mother-tongue-based education is systematically integrated across curriculum development, teaching practice and school governance.

KECD leads the development of mother-tongue curricula, textbooks and learning materials that are culturally relevant and aligned with community values. By institutionalizing the use of Karen and other local languages as languages of instruction in early and primary education, KECD strengthens foundational learning, comprehension, and learning participation.

In addition, KECD oversees teacher recruitment, training, and professional development, with a strong emphasis on culturally responsive pedagogy and mother-tongue-based multilingual education. This includes preparing teachers to support students' gradual transition to additional languages while maintain strong first-language foundations. KECD also coordinates with community education community-rooted governance model, KECD enhances system resilience, accountability, and local ownership.

Technical and Implementation Collaboration: Role of the Karen Teacher Working Group (KTWG)

Under the overall leadership and policy direction of Karen Education and Culture Department (KECD), the Karen Teachers Working Group (KTWG) serves as a key technical and implementation organization within the Kawthoolei education system. KTWG provides specialized support in teacher training, pedagogical mentoring, and classroom practice, with a strong focus on mother-tongue-based multilingual education. Through pre-service and in-service training, KTWG strengthens teachers' capacity deliver effective first-language instruction and to support learners' gradual transition to additional languages.

KTWG also contributes to the development, piloting and adaptation of teaching and learning materials in mother languages, ensuring that curricula are practically applicable and responsive to classroom realities. By working closely with KECD, township education, and community schools, KTWG helps effective teaching and learning outcome at school level.

International Mother Language Day celebrates linguistic diversity and reaffirms the right of all learners to receive education in their mother language. It highlights the essential role that languages play in education, inclusion and sustainable development.
